You Helped Make 2007 a Record Year!

As the Humane Society of Charlotte heads into its 30th year of service to pets and pet owners in the Carolinas, we reflect upon numerous achievements and milestones in 2007 as we look forward to a busy and even more successful 2008.

Adoptions and Intake – We had a record 1,403 adoptions in 2007 and December was our highest adoption month ever with a record of 169 animals placed into their new forever homes. Expanding our customer service staff also allowed us to bring in even more homeless and unwanted pets.

Spay/Neuter Surgeries – More than 7,500 spay/neuter surgeries were performed at our two clinics in 2007. Waiting times to get a surgery appointment were reduced, as was the waiting list for our indigent clients served through a joint grant with Charlotte Mecklenburg Animal Care & Control made possible by the Patterson Fund through the Foundation for the Carolinas.

Fundraising – By implementing an aggressive direct mail plan, we added new donors to our HSC family, increased fundraising overall and held some impressive fundraising events, including PetPalooza that raised more than \$100,000 on a beautiful fall Saturday.

what's coming in 2008

We will continue to increase our focus of touching even more pet's lives throughout the Carolinas in 2008 by focusing even more on matching surrendered pets with their new forever families, improving our facilities and providing even more

spay/neuter surgeries to reduce unwanted pet overpopulation.

Kitty Corner – This spring, we will move into the remodeling phase of Kitty Corner with the upgrade of cages, improved air handling and more sunlight for our feline friends to enjoy. Some of our larger expenses include an industrial dishwasher, washer and dryer, so if you know of a corporation that would be in a position to donate these items, we would love to hear from you.

Flying Colors – This color coded matching system will help the public identify which animals are the best fit with their lifestyle to strengthen the human-animal bond that is developed during the adoption process.

Fundraising Events – Whether it's a spring pet walk in Plaza-Midwood, an art event in SouthEnd or our annual PetPalooza – which will move to Independence Park in 2008 - see our center spread on pages four and five to find out how you can help us raise money and have fun in the process!

Website Improvements – We are in the process of making our website (humanesocietyofcharlotte.org) even more user-friendly. It's still the number one place to see what animals are available for adoption, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, but if you have suggestions for improvement, we would love to hear them.

Again, we thank you for your support in 2007 and look forward to making our vision of every animal in a safe and loving home come true in 2008!

As I start my second year here at the Humane Society of Charlotte, the accomplishments the organization made in 2007 were impressive. We've made a

lot of progress, and I'm most grateful to our staff, board of directors, and volunteers - and you! - who have embraced the changes we've made and remained visionary as we move forward.

In December, we had our highest-ever month of adoptions with 169, which contributed to an overall record of 1,403 animals going home with their forever families last year.

Adopting animals into their new forever homes is just part of the circle of life here at the Humane Society of Charlotte. It begins with prevention of unwanted pets through spay/neuter surgeries performed at our two clinics, which totaled 7,586 in 2007.

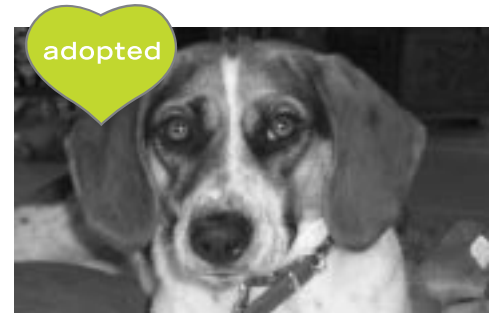


Morton

Critter Care

yes, all of those vaccinations are important!

The day is here! You are finally adopting your newest family member, so do what you can to protect your new pet from sickness. Fortunately, there are many very serious diseases that can be prevented by following a vaccine schedule.

An animal's immune system fights disease by attacking the organism within the infected body. The immune system has a form of memory, whereby it learns to recognize a disease organism and therefore will be more efficient in defending the body against it in the future. Vaccinations contain disease-causing organisms such as viruses, which have been killed or damaged in some way, so they no longer cause illness. The body's

immune system creates antibodies which attack the vaccine and learn to recognize the organism without actually contracting the disease. If in the future a true infection occurs, the body is ready to fight!

When an animal is born, they receive antibodies from their mother. These antibodies will protect from disease until their body's immune system is mature, generally until the puppy or kitten is between six weeks and sixteen weeks old. Meanwhile, the animal's own immune system develops and the immunities donated by mom wanes. You should vaccinate as close to this transition time as possible, and every two to four weeks during this crucial time is recommended..

After the four-month milestone, most vaccinated puppies and kittens are well protected from serious diseases including rabies, parvo and bordatella. Vaccines are "boostered" about a year later, then a schedule of future vaccinations will be recommended by your veterinarian. It is important to remember that female dogs and cats should always be vaccinated prior to breeding, as those important maternal antibodies will only help protect the offspring if mom has been vaccinated.

So, plan on multiple vet visits while your new baby is growing up, and throughout their life ... it will help keep them healthy, and help ensure you both a long life together!

monthly giving and Bi-Lo Boosters!

We are unveiling two new programs to facilitate your financial support of the nearly 1,500 animals who come through our doors every year.

Our monthly giving program allows pet lovers to provide support to the Humane Society of Charlotte every month with minimal effort. You may elect to have a pre-authorized amount debited from your checking account or charged to your credit card (think frequent flyer miles!). No more filling out

forms, sending checks in the mail and best of all, it is effortless to support the animals in our care on an ongoing basis.

You may also elect to, rather than receiving a separate acknowledgement letter each time your account is debited or charged, receive one year-end statement for tax purposes. That means less paper, printing and postage for us, as well as one simple year-end statement for your taxes.
